

New Delhi / Zagreb, December 20, 2021: The India-Croatia Startup Bridge was officially launched in a hybrid mode at the site of BIRD Incubator in Zagreb. The launch ceremony was held as a joint endeavor of HAMAG-BICRO & Startup India. This initiative aims to strengthen the ongoing trade and economic collaboration between India and Croatia. India has similar Startup Bridges with other countries such as Japan, Sweden, Portugal, Republic of Korea, etc. Croatia's innovation and startup ecosystem has been growing at a rapid pace, particularly in the cities of Zagreb, Split, Rijeka and Osijek. The Croatian Digital industry has grown four times faster than Croatia's GDP, and this year it has become even more clear how much impact it has on the nation's exports. 



Microsoft's Nadella, Google's Pichai, and now Twitter's Agrawal: Why Indian-born leaders dominate American tech's top ranks [Written by BY VIVEK WADHWA]

The article summarizes the sucess of Indian-born leaders, including Parag Agrawal, who was appointed as Twitter's CEO, Microsoft's Satya Nadella, Alphabet's Sundar Pichai, and the top bosses of IBM, Adobe, Palo Alto Networks, VMWare and Vimeo are all of Indian descent, ominate American tech's top ranks.



Culture, as much as education, is key

Vivek Wadhwa came to the U.S. in 1980 and observed the evolution of the Valley's leadership firsthand while founding two technology companies and taking one of them public. Later, at Duke University, I researched what had given Indians like me such an advantage. According to research by University of California at Berkeley professor AnnaLee Saxenian, as of 1999 immigrants accounted for one-third of the scientific and engineering workforce in Silicon Valley, and Indian CEOs were running 7% of its high-technology firms. In 2006, my research team collaborated with Saxenian to update her work and found that the percentage of immigrant-founded startups had increased to 52.4%, with Indian-born executives having founded 15.5% of Silicon Valley tech firms—though they constituted only 6% of the Valley's working population. We found that 96% of the immigrant entrepreneurs involved in engineering and technology had completed a bachelor's degree, and 74% held master's or Ph.D. degrees. Within that group, Indian founders had been educated in a diverse set of universities; the famed Indian Institutes of Technology, for example, accounted for only 15% of the company founders. Culture, as much as education, is key There is no doubt that education gave the Indians an advantage. But this does not explain why the boards of companies such as Microsoft, Google, IBM, and Twitter would choose foreign-born technologists over equally qualified Americans. The answer may lie in cultural values, upbringing, and struggles. In a land of more than a billion people, most of whom are hampered by rampant corruption, weak infrastructure, and limited opportunities, it takes a lot to simply survive, let alone to get ahead. Indians learn to be resilient, battle endless obstacles, and make the most of what they have. In India, you learn to work around the problems that an unjust state and society create for you. Entrepreneurship, along with the creativity and resourcefulness required to deal with all the obstacles, is part of life. Indians have many ethnic, racial, gender, and caste biases—as do people all over the world. Yet in order to succeed, they learn to overlook or adapt these biases when necessary. There are six major religions in India, and the Indian constitution recognizes 22 regional languages. Every region in the country has its own customs and character, and people accept differences in attitudes and beliefs, especially in the context of business. Then there is the humility that comes from moving to new lands. Talk to almost any immigrant, regardless of origin, and he or she will share stories about leaving social status behind in their home country and working their way up from the bottom of the ladder in the adopted land. It's a humbling process; you learn many valuable lessons when starting from scratch and working your way to success. These are all traits that any board would recognizeand value—especially when the alternatives are arrogant company founders who believe they are entitled to their jobs. And it's these traits that enable a CEO to transform company culture. This is what I believe has article aiven Indian **CEOs** the advantage. India has been singled out as the leading country for Responsible Tourism at the WTM Responsible Tourism Awards. Launched in 2004, the event recognizes and rewards businesses and destinations which are contributing to a more sustainable tourism industry. Organizers noted that in 2008, the southwestern coastal state of Kerala led the way when it hosted the 2nd International Conference on Responsible Tourism in Destinations. From this, the Responsible Tourism Mission was born and rolled out across Kerala. Its benefits were soon recognized by other states in India. The 2021 Global Award winners were selected from the Best of India and the Rest of the World Awards along with the best entries from Africa and Latin America. Govardhan Village is a 100-acre retreat centre and model farm community in Maharashtra, India. The campus provides residential conferences and study programmes, attracting 50,000 tourists a year. It avoids emissions through solar panels which deliver almost 185,000 units of electricity annually. Cow dung and other wet waste are converted into electricity, while plastic waste is converted into both light diesel oil and electricity. The site also uses Soil Bio-Technology to process sewage into greywater for irrigation, so there is no need to pump water from the river. Buildings on the campus are built from compressed stabilized earth blocks (DSEB) which use less energy, and all materials are sourced from within 100km to reduce carbon emissions from transport.













Fourth T of "Trade" between India & Croatia – Way below the potential when both countries have rebounded back well addressing the challenges of the pandemic

Commerce and Industry Minister Mr Piyush Goyal said on 14 December that India's merchandise export was set to touch an all-time high of \$400 billion during the current financial year, driven by sharp uptick in shipments. As per a preliminary trade data, India's merchandise exports in April-November 2021 were at \$262.46 billion, an increase of 50.71 per cent over \$174.15 billion in the same period of the previous financial year. Here is a snapshot of Indian exports to Croatia in the first nine months of 2021. The cylindrical bars representing monthly contributions from Jan-Sep. The amount shown are in thousand dollars. The total exports from India to Croatia in nine months of 2021 touched almost USD 100 million.



Presenting the draft budget for 2022 in the national parliament on 1 December, Prime Minister Plenković announced a shift from crisis management to efforts to boost competitiveness and create new jobs. Croatian economy bounced back supported by strong private consumption, the better-than-expected performance of tourism industry and the boom in merchandise exports, that in the first nine months of 2021 amounted to 13.3 billion euros, an annual increase of 24.6 per cent. This made 2021 for Croatian exports, a record year, as the score from 2019 was exceeded by 2 billion euros. Here is a snapshot of Croatian exports to India in the first nine months of 2021. The total exports from Croatia to India in nine months of 2021 touched USD 27 million.

Resilient supply chain. Sydney has started its first fully automated driverless metro trains that had been assembled in Andhra Pradesh, India, between Tallawang and Chatswood stations on the North West Rail Link. Alstom SA - a French manufacturing company - is responsible for manufacturing the driverless trains. According to local media reports, these trains were assembled at Sri City in Andhra Pradesh. The metro trains are totally automated with automatic LED lighting. At the same time, security features such as an emergency intercom and CCTV cameras have been installed on the locomotives.

Chipset maker, Intel, is planning to set up its semiconductor manufacturing unit in India. The US-based chipset giant announcement came in the back drop of recent Union Cabinet's decision on semiconductors that will encourage research and innovation in the sector and also boost manufacturing, strengthening the 'Aatmanirbhar Bharat' programme. The Minister for IT and Electronics, Ashwini Vaishnaw, welcomed Intel to India by tweeting. He wrote, "Intel - welcome to India."

Kidambi Srikanth wins silver medal at Badminton World Championships. Shuttler Kidambi Srikanth became the first Indian man to win a silver medal at the BWF World Championships. Singapore's Loh Kean Yew defeated Kidambi in the summit clash 21-15, 22-20. The final lasted for 43 minutes. The former world No. 1 Kidambi Srikanth became the first Indian to win a silver in the men's singles at the badminton world championships, with Prakash Padukone (1983), B Sai Praneeth (2019) and Lakshya Sen (2021) winning a bronze each.

Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi visited Goa on 19th December and attended the function marking Goa Liberation Day celebrations at Dr. Shyama Prasad Mukherjee Stadium in Goa. Prime Minister felicitated the freedom fighters and veterans of 'Operation Vijay' at the function. Goa Liberation Day is celebrated on December 19 every year to mark the success of 'Operation Vijay' undertaken by the Indian Armed Forces that liberated Goa from Portuguese rule. Prime Minister inaugurated multiple development projects including the renovated Fort Aguada Jail Museum, Super Speciality Block at Goa Medical College, New South Goa District Hospital, Aviation Skill Development Center at Mopa Airport and the Gas insulated Substation at Dabolim-Navelim, Margao. He also lay the foundation Stone for India International University of Legal Education and Research of Bar Council of India Trust at Goa.

Razorpay has raised \$375 million (Rs 2,850 crore) in a new funding round led by US-based investors TCV, Lone Pine Capital and Alkeon Capital, after which its valuation has grown to \$7.5 billion—a jump of two-and-a-half times in eight months. The Bengaluru-based payments gateway platform had in April this year raised \$160 million at a post-money valuation of \$3 billion. The company has seen a seven-fold increase in its valuation in a little over a year since it turned unicorn.

Central Drugs Standard Control Organisation has given approval to Corbevax vaccine, Covovax vaccine and anti-viral drug Molnupiravir for restricted use in emergency situations. In a series of tweets, Union Health Minister Mansukh Mandaviya said, Corbevax vaccine is India's first indigenously developed RBD protein sub-unit vaccine against COVID-19, made by Hyderabad-based firm Biological-E. It is the third vaccine developed in India. The Nanoparticle Vaccine, Covovax, will be manufactured by Punebased firm Serum Institute of India. Mr. Mandaviya said, Molnupiravir will now be manufactured in the country by 13 companies for restricted use under emergency situation for treatment of adult patients with COVID-19 and who have high risk of progression of the disease. He added that Prime Minister Narendra Modi led the battle against COVID-19 from the front and all these approvals will further strengthen the global fight against the pandemic.

2021 In Review | Indian startups bag record \$36 billion funds in 2021

With an increased demand for digitalization in the wake of the Covid-19 outbreak, India's startup ecosystem saw a record investment of roughly US\$ 36 billion in privately-held enterprises this year. According to Pregin, a UK-based investment data platform, venture and private equity investments surged thrice throughout the year, from US\$ 11 billion in 2020 to US\$ 31 billion in 2021. The volume of seed-stage deals dominated this year, with roughly 396 deals totaling US\$ 705.86 million, while around 166 series A investments totalled about US\$ 1.67 billion, according to data through December 20. The majority of the funds went to pre-IPO funding rounds in companies like Zomato, Ola, Policybazaar, and Paytm, with the top 10 deals totalling US\$ 5.58 billion, according to Prequin data. Aside from an increase in the number of deals, Indian entrepreneurs raised larger financing rounds this year than in prior years, as risk capital investors stepped up to take bigger bets on high-growth companies early on. As a result, companies have been able to obtain greater valuations, with prices frequently doubling or tripling in subsequent fundraising rounds. "Valuations are a reflection of an investor's exit expectations. 2021 has proven the full venture cycle for India. Some fabulous exits like Zomato, Nykaa, PolicyBazaar and others have increased exit size expectations, and consequently the valuations," said Alok Goyal, founder and investment partner at Stellaris Venture Partners, an early-stage VC firm. Funds such as Tiger Global, Falcon Edge, Seguoia Capital, Accel, and Blume Ventures were the most active investors in 2021. SoftBank, which is known for its huge bets, invested more than US\$ 3 billion in Indian businesses, making it the Japanese investment firm's largest infusion in India in a single year. Unicorns, a term used to describe companies valued at USS\$ 1 billion or more, have spawned by hundreds this year. A week in April saw half a dozen entrepreneurs join the unicorn club in a matter of four days, bringing the total number of unicorns to around 40. But it wasn't just unicorns that raised numerous rounds this year; high-growth companies did as well, signaling a strong desire to back the leaders. Cred, Of Business, Groww, and Cars24 are fintech startups whose valuation grew in the last year. Vaibhay Agrawal, a partner at Lightspeed India, which has backed new unicorns of 2021 like ShareChat and Apna Co., stated, "Through 2021 we experienced a strong positive shift in the quality of founding teams, depth of markets, unit economics and exit opportunities via public markets. As a result, investors across stages felt comfortable writing larger cheques and taking more risk." Unicorn founders believe that because there are fewer assets in late-stage funding deals, marguee investors are willing to sweeten the deal. "Founders (must) dilute less, and this cash can come in handy during rainy days," stated a top unicorn entrepreneur who raised funding three times this year stated. The year tech IPOs became a reality. When Indian entrepreneurs spoke about an initial public offering (IPO), it didn't seem a viable option for a long time, but that changed in 2021. The year was a defining moment in the ability of technology-driven enterprises to access public markets, with the majority of them being rewarded by public investors as well. This year, smaller companies like gaming business Nazara Technologies went public, but it was food delivery service Zomato's Rs 9,000 crores (US\$ 1.19 billion) IPO that truly laid the stage for at least a half-dozen top-leading startups filing for an IPO in India. Zomato's stellar listing this year has caused its founders to reconsider their IPO timeframes and consider it a genuine prospect for 2022 and 2023. Others have raised roughly US\$ 2.5 billion from public market investors, including Policybazaar, Nykaa, and Paytm. Source: India Times

Byju's 13th most valued unicorn, first Indian start-up to reach \$21-bn

Byju's, the most valued edtech startup in the world has entered this year's global list of 35 elite unicorns with over US\$ 10 billion valuation. Byju's becomes the first domestic startup to reach a valuation of US\$ 21 billion and ranks 13th largest unicorn in the globe based on a report by CB insights. China and US accounts of 75% of the top 35 start-ups in the world. UK has three while India, Australia, Brazil and Sweden have one each in the list. Oyo rooms and Ola could have entered in the India's US\$ 10bn plus startups list, but second wave of the pandemic hit those expectations. Many other players too dropped off the list like Zomato, Policybazaar.com and Paytm, because they have gone for IPO and are listed in the exchange. *Source*.

Rewinding of First 25 years of Ministry of Electronics and Information Technology

While unveiling the book titled "Rewinding of First 25 years of Ministry of Electronics and Information Technology," Mr. Ajay Prakash Sawhney, Secretary in the Ministry of IT, stated on December 16, 2021 that India has added about 40 unicorns in the previous 50 weeks in the startup world. He also mentioned that India's software exports increased to Rs 5000 billion (USD 70 billion) today compared to Rs 51 crore in 1987, representing a 35% annual growth for the last 30 years. *Source*.

India overtakes UK to come third in unicorn race: Hurun report

According to a new Hurun India study, India has surpassed the UK to occupy 3rd place with 54 unicorns. Bengaluru has more unicorns than cities such as Boston, Palo Alto, Paris, Berlin, and Chicago, with a total of 28 unicorns, the seventh highest in the world. Unlisted companies with a market capitalization of US\$ 1 billion or more are known as unicorns. According to the Hurun research, India now has 54 unicorns, 33 more than in 2020, while the UK has 39 unicorns, 15 more than a year ago. India was the most popular destination for emigrant unicorn creators, followed by China, Israel, and Russia. Indians have launched 65 unicorns outside of India, including Postman, Innovaccer, Icertis, and Moglix. Anas Rahman Junaid, Managing Director and Chief Researcher, Hurun India, said that "Whilst there are a further 65 unicorns founded by Indians abroad, mainly in Silicon Valley, the percentage of homegrown unicorns has increased from one third to 45%, suggesting that the startup ecosystem in India is maturing." *Source*.


